**MINUTES
MONTHLY MEETING
SIXTH TAXING DISTRICT, City of Norwalk
July 14, 2010
Rowayton Community Center
8:00 p.m.**

The July meeting of the Sixth Taxing District Commission was called to order by Commission Chair Tammy Langalis at 8:20 p.m. She introduced the Commission and the newly appointed Treasurer John Verel.

The minutes of the June 9, 2010 meeting were approved as submitted.

Under OLD BUSINESS, an update on the city's fence project for Old School Field was given. The City will be replacing the old chain link fence with a cedar wood square lattice fence in the near future. Recreation and Parks Director Mike Mocciaie has been working with the Commission and with Doug Bora on this project. There will be a wire running along the top of the fence which will facilitate the hanging of signs from the wire. The work will be done within this month. The City's DPW will be working to get better drainage at the Old School Field/Witch Lane Park. The northwest corner will be a perennial garden in the future. Right now that area will be mulched. The DPW is also committed to having the sidewalk at that venue repaired. It will, possibly, be replaced with brick.

The state of the newly planted dogwoods along Highland Avenue has caused quite a stir amongst the district residents. These trees were planted by Almstead at the direction of the City of Norwalk. The city has contacted Almstead and they have removed the dead trees, which they had guaranteed. The Commissioners feel that both Almstead and the City has been responsive to the Commission and others.

The new fire truck is close to being finished and will be ready for inspection by the first week of August. It will first go to Rocky Hill to have tools, radios, etc. mounted on it. It is to be delivered to us around the time of Labor Day.

Under NEW BUSINESS, the District Administrator, Jack Robson, reported that the maple tree just behind the Museum building lost a very large section a few weeks ago. This limb fell into Mr. Nightingale's property, which borders the Pinkney property.

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The debris was cleared by Hutchinson Tree Care Specialists. They were there working on Mr. Nightingale's property. It was quicker to use them than wait a week for others to become available. Waiting was creating problems for the grass and flower beds on Mr. Nightingale's property. Our cost for clean up was **\$950.00**. This tree needs to come down as it presents a danger to the museum building, as well as anticipated danger to Mr. Nightingale's property.

I requested two estimates for the removal of this tree:

Larry Brown Tree & Shrub Care, Inc. **\$1,500.00**

Grinding of stump is not necessary due to the location.

Hutchinson Tree Care Specialists, Inc. **\$2,400.00**

I am recommending that we use Larry Brown for this work.

In addition there is a similar problem tree behind the Pinkney House that lost a large limb in the spring. Larry Brown said it was questionable at the time. The cost for Larry Brown to remove this tree is **\$1,500.00**. We should add grinding the stump due to the location. Cost: **\$200 - \$300 extra**. Tammy asked about whether we have money in the budget to do this work. Jack said that he thought removal of the tree nearest the Nightingale property should be dealt with right away. John Igneri is in favor of taking down both at the same time. Mike Barbis noted that we had cut the budget so much at Pinkney and other costs will arise shortly, that he isn't sure we have the money now. Jack, John Igneri and John Verel will work on this issue and give their recommendations. John Igneri stated that as long as we were speaking of Pinkney, he would like to bring up an e-mail that was sent calling for the public shaming for the people involved who left Pinkney Park in such a state after the River Ramble and SOS. The issue has been resolved. SOS is coming down to pick up the shredded tire debris. The lawns will be replanted in late summer when it is the best time to do that. The Commissioners feel that everything looks pretty good now. Mike and John both disagreed that the RCA had left the park in bad condition.

The Shelley Trubowitz Memorial Garden at Bayley Beach was planted last year. It is a nice garden but no one was really appointed to maintain it. The Commissioners asked the Rowayton Tennis Association if they would maintain it. They were very responsive. However, the job may be bigger than they had anticipated. Tammy said that the Commissioners need to figure out whose garden it is and who is responsible for maintaining it. The Rowayton Gardeners have traditionally taken care of gardens on the beach side and the tennis association has taken care of their end of the property. Ed Carlson will work with the RTA to take care of it. Ed mentioned that Larry Brown is bringing chips in for that space. The RTA has been doing more landscaping than they have in years past. Ed will speak with Brooke Sessions and/or Pete Koerner and we'll work something out.

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Concerning the construction at the RR station, District Administrator Jack Robson reported that approximately two years ago, he was called to attend a meeting at the RR station. The purpose was to hear what was being planned and what was to be done. Mr. Rodney Armstrong headed up the meeting. Pat Proto, the Assistant Resident Engineer and DPW's Engineer, Brian Sweeney, were present.

I questioned the landscaping plan and suggested that the entrance to the west bound side needed to be terraced as the slope on the entrance was severe. Mr. Armstrong said that all he had in his budget for landscaping was seed. Seed will not hold on this slope. If it did, it would be next to impossible to maintain. A concrete wall wrapping around the steep slope from the bottom of the stairs to the entrance ramp for the west side parking lot would cut down on the grade and, in doing so, shrubs and maintenance free plants could be installed to hold the land.

When I questioned the reasoning for putting up a chain link fence next to the new concrete stairs and walls, Mr. Armstrong stated that they saw a potential problem with the wall and needed to prevent commuters from taking short cuts over the new concrete stairs and wall which might cause accidents. They realized that there was a danger of electrocution should a commuter touch the metal fence if a live wire fell on it. They then had to ground the fence adding more unnecessary expense.

I questioned the lack of planning in construction to end up with a fence behind a new wall because of a design flaw. Mr. Armstrong did not deny the error, but this is the way the wall was going to end up. I stated that it was unacceptable. I suggested that they at least incorporate the protection of the chain link fence into the concrete stairs and wall by installing a railing or fence that was esthetically pleasing as well as functional.

This fell on deaf ears.

It is my opinion that perhaps the Commissioners might approach Craig Brodiere and see if this situation can be improved since my efforts did not produce results. I took photos of our station after this meeting along with examples of other stations for comparison. One example was at Darien train station and other concrete walls in our area that incorporated chain link fencing. Three photo albums on this subject are for the Commissioners to review. I feel a more decorative, simple metal fence would be esthetically better than a chain link fence if it were to be installed in the concrete wall and stairs.

Mrs. Langalis noted that Andy Conroy was writing a letter to Craig Bordiere at this very time on a different subject and she asked if he might include our feelings regarding this construction in that letter. Mike Barbis said that we should really be talking with Craig Bordiere on this subject. We should also research whether other stations were

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getting any money for landscaping. Brian Sweeney has said he would look into the landscaping issue after the whole project is done. Mr. Sweeney is an engineer with DPW. Mike Barbis suggested that if there is money in the train budget, maybe we should use some of that money for the landscaping. Ms. Langalis asked Jack Robson to write a letter to officially communicate our desire to be more involved in the landscaping decisions. The letter should also include the question of when the construction work is scheduled to be finished since we can't landscape until the project is done, especially since the DOT workers totally disregard any parking rules at the station and could destroy any work that was done. Nancy Heubeck noted that the landscaping project and the station budget issues need to be kept separate in hopes that they will each carry more weight.

Gail Jaques asked what kind of signs are allowed to be put on the Old School Fence. Mike Barbis noted that there shouldn't be any commercial signs. Ed Carlson noted that he has seen notices posted for events in Darien. Mike Barbis also noted that this should be self-policed. Some commercial signs have been taken down. However, we can't really make rules concerning the fence since this is not a District fence, but a city fence. There is a gray area where some individual residents' commercial concerns are posted and it falls into a service to the community to remind them of camps or lessons, etc. Lynne Pratt recommended that there be some time limit put on the signs. Dick Schock said that he gets a lot of questions at the railroad station that could be answered if there were some way to post notices at the station.

Gail Jaques thanked the Commission and Ed Carlson, in particular, for the great job on the new dog fence. Everyone seems pretty happy now. The chain link fence that was damaged by falling trees has been repaired.

Lynne Pratt asked that some consideration be made to the use of Bayley Beach for RCA concerts which attract so many concert goers that residents are negatively impacted in enjoying Bayley Beach. She especially noted the very crowded conditions on July 4. She noted that the concerts cause a significant amount of traffic and responsibility for the District. She feels that the beach staff can't cope with the crowds. She feels that the concerts add to the congestion at the beach, especially on July 4 when the fireworks alone are a big draw. Tammy thanked Lynne for her comments. The beach was charging admission up until 7 p.m. and is a good revenue source for the District. Lynne also mentioned that having a band at high tide when residents wish to enjoy the swimming creates even more of a problem. Mike Barbis noted that the RCA had specifically scheduled concerts at low tide. However, he did say that in July two of the four Sundays were scheduled at high tide. The last two concerts were both at low tide. Also, all the concerts in August are scheduled for Pinkney Park so that the possible increased use of the beach is mostly confined to one of the two main months of the summer. Tammy mentioned that the Commissioners had asked the RCA to schedule concerts with bands that didn't have such large followings in hopes of limiting somewhat the attendance at

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these concerts. Tammy mentioned that she had been at the beach on the 4th of July and it was crowded. She felt that the crowd was well controlled and that the RCA had hired enough police for the event. She suggested that the RCA might consider having a less popular band for the 4th of July in the future, but noted that many of our residents do enjoy the entertainment on these holidays. There has been a suggestion that the District charge more for entry on big holidays, as other towns do. Ms. Langalis noted that the District tries to be a kind and welcoming entity and not take away from the celebration by being overly officious. The Commissioners think that Sue did a great job on the gate on the 4th and that the whole beach staff did a great job of crowd control. Louise Tyler noted that there were several canopies erected on the beach that interrupted the line of sight to the light house. She would like to see these banned. She also asked whether it was the residents or the out-of-towners who were really enjoying the beach. Tammy reminded her that, by law, we cannot turn away anyone who wishes to use the beach and is either a resident or is willing to pay the entry fee and that she recommended that anyone wishing to park at the beach should get there early in the day.

Louise Tyler also brought up another issue that she feels that not all the lifeguards have presented proper certification. She is concerned for the potential liability for the District. She suggested that there be one day before the season starts that they all present certification. She is concerned that not all the lifeguards are really qualified. The Commissioners will inquire about the existence of certification.

REPORTS

Commissioner John Igneri reported that the new insurance company is on board and has done a study of valuations of district property, thereby saving us some money. The new insurance company is HD Segur.

Commissioner Mike Barbis reported that he was talking with Tom Robinson about looking after the Rowayton Cemetery. He doesn't think that we ever put any money aside for this venue. Tom thinks there are some trees that need to be taken down and he asked if the District might have any funds they could contribute to this effort. Mr. Barbis suggested that would be possible only if our tree budget came in less than budgeted. Ed Carlson agreed to take a look at the trees and see if they might be able to do something. He will report back. It might be able to go into the budget for the next Fiscal Year.

Regarding the long term plan for the Community Center, the committee is proceeding with an application for a state grant that might provide up to \$200,000 in matching funds for the refurbishment of the Community Center. The Commissioners have committed to giving them some funds that we had budgeted for roof work to help them to apply for this grant. They are planning on turning in the application in October. We have committed \$5,000 towards the architectural drawings and plans needed for submission

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of the request. Mike has asked them to work on a long term plan which they would talk about at our next meeting. This might be a two-stage plan and might be beyond what we were originally planning to do. The first stage might be the roof, for instance.

Mike had a meeting with the Rowayton Historical Society and reports that the RHS and the District are making progress on finalizing rules for the potential rental of Pinkney Park and/or House for private events.

Mr. Barbis has been approached by a number of people asking if there could be some more shade trees planted at Bayley Beach. It was a part of our tree plan. Our tree budget has some surplus in it as the city had paid for the dogwoods and offset some of the costs for some of the other trees at the Community Center. Therefore, we might be able to look into that. Andy Conroy noted that Rowayton School added quite a number of trees to their back lot some years ago and it is a lot cooler there now.

Mike suggested coming up with a little flyer or notice regarding garbage pickup schedules and rules relating to what could be recycled, etc. That will be worked on.

Bayley Beach Director Don Wilson Mid-Summer Report

This is my mid-summer report pertaining to all aspects of Bayley Beach which, as director, I have given for seventeen years.

The beach opened on May 14 for preparation prior to the Memorial Day weekend. Seven lifeguards were hired for the 2010 summer season, some part time and some full time. Five lifeguards have returned from last year. Four gate guards were hired to work from 10:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

As Beach Director, my responsibilities remain the same as in previous years. I oversee the maintenance of the beach and deal with the duties of the lifeguards and gate guards.

The beach was sifted and raked in mid May. Another raking is scheduled in July. All of the 30 picnic tables were painted by the lifeguards and myself.

The fireworks celebration on July 4 was a huge success. The vehicles were parked in an orderly fashion by Sue and Melissa, our two valuable gate guards. A total of 4,500 people entered Bayley Beach to see the fireworks this year, a display that lasted 35 minutes. No problems were encountered that evening. Parking was helped by new lines which were painted earlier to control the flow of traffic.

Joe Gallo is enjoying his twelfth summer running the concession. He began recently to serve meals on Wednesday evenings again this year.

The RCA has sponsored six bands at the beach which are scheduled to appear Sundays at

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5:30 p.m. through Labor Day weekend.

I wish to thank Mike Barbis for overseeing the responsibilities of my position, Ed Carlson for performing so many tasks on a daily basis, Andrea Woodworth for her keen awareness of details and procedures, and Andy Conroy for his payroll responsibilities.

There was a suggestion that maybe some notice could be given as to when the beach parking lot becomes full. Ed Carlson said that when the fireworks are over, inbound traffic is stopped to allow the most efficient exit of the cars parked at the various beach venues. This has the potential of making it very difficult for any potential inbound emergency vehicles to access the beaches. The RCA representative, Wendy Ford, noted that the RCA had put up 400 no parking signs. The police were there and did a good job. However, Tammy noted that the police didn't block Roton and McKinley as they should have done. Mike Barbis noted that the police did a great job contrary to our past experience with them at other events. He felt that the group of police this year was the best group we've ever had.

Andy Conroy is resigning and John Verel has agreed to serve the rest of Andy's term of District Treasurer. Tammy made a motion, which passed, that the Commission would appoint John Verel as District Treasurer to serve out the balance of the term of Andy Conroy, effective immediately or at the time when it is approved. The Commissioners expressed their gratitude to Andy for all of his valuable service to the District as did the attendees, with a round of applause.

6. In response to one of our letters regarding the speeding traffic on Roton Avenue and Pine Point Roads, I had a call from Tim Szemplinski. He is the club ass't. manager at WeeBurn Beach Club. He had occasion to be standing at the entrance to WeeBurn one week day morning and witnessed that speeding traffic. He called to encourage us to have motorists ticketed for so blatantly ignoring the speed restriction. Of course, that is not our function, but he wanted to pass on his opinion. He said that all of his members have been warned - and, hopefully, the members of the other club and Bayley Beach goers and tennis players understand this as well.

7. Packer Soccer had a camp at the Rowayton School Field last week. They used the Community Center for sign-ups and set up of the end of week awards. This year they also had a group of very young children participating in soccer activities on the CC lawn. We may want to look at this arrangement next year.

8. During the very hot days last week, the Library was designated as a "cooling center" by the Mayor. The Community Center "Moose Room" was opened for that function as well, under the direction of Cynthia and Ed.

Remarks to the Commissioners: If there are available funds in the new fiscal year, I would like to see the kitchen hood suppression system tied into the building alarm system.

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Ed Carlson noted that it has been fairly quiet. There was a fire on Monday morning at Don Wilson's house. Ed has met with the fire inspector and the insurance adjustor. It has been determined that the cause of the fire was old wiring. One fire fighter was taken to the hospital for heat exhaustion. Everyone did a great job and the Rowayton Volunteer Fire Department had responded in six minutes.

Regarding the hood suppression system in the kitchen, code requires tying it to the alarm system in the building. He has previously obtained an estimate to bring it into compliance and that would be \$500. Tammy asked if the stove was used. The answer was that it is, though rarely.

July 2010

Community Center:

1. The new fence for the dog park is completed. I have received many positive comments.
2. The faucet on the kitchen sink has been replaced.
3. Some of the catch basin structures are in poor condition. There will need to be funds allotted for their repair.

Bayley Beach:

1. The men's room toilet was replaced after the sewer line was found to be clear of obstruction. The replacement has taken care of the flushing problem.

Pinkney Park:

1. The cleanup by SOS to remove the shredded rubber has not been completed. There are many ruts from trucks that need to be taken care of. Late August - early September will be the proper time.

Mike Barbis said that a representative of one of the cell phone companies had approached him with the desire to install a cell phone tower somewhere in town. They have approached the fire department and wanted to put a tower in that building. The fire department didn't really have the space necessary. They were pretty far along in planning a tower to be placed at 137 Rowayton Avenue. Planning and Zoning does not want them to put a tower there. They are also wanting to do something here at the Community Center. The company is T-Mobile. Mike has asked the representative to send specifications that would be necessary at any location. They didn't want to do that until they got a commitment from the owner of the property first. The roof and spire of the United Church doesn't lend itself to their plans. Lynne Pratt said that she understood that

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the land requirement is considerable. Ed Carlson said that they want a clear line of sight. Hill Top was suggested as a possible location. Hill Top is a HUD facility. John Igneri said that he believes that they need a 17' x 17' space for the base. They have also looked near Roton. More information will have to be obtained.

Tammy also wanted to express the gratitude of the residents whose fire alarm went off while they were at the River Ramble. They were most grateful to the RVFD and to the people at the River Ramble who watched their kids while they went home to investigate.

Report of Officer Jensen

Joe reported that there is not much news right now. The police department has been very busy, but not in Rowayton. It has been discovered that the entire fleet of Hatch & Bailey trucks were all unregistered.

Joe is trying to get the radar trailer back here. Tammy thanked Joe for the times he has been able to get it here.

Joe would recommend having one more person on the gate to help Sue and Melissa during the fireworks or other high volume times. Tammy said we will tell Don to get another person. There was a person selling water just outside the gate. Sue asked him to leave since it was in competition with the concession. She was very conscientious in enforcing all the rules.

Joe said again that we need the assistance of Darien in stopping the thru trucks that are still using Rte.136 in Rowayton. A city recycling truck comes through Rowayton and should not be using this route. The Commissioners will talk with the Darien Police Department and/or the Darien First Selectman Doug Campbell to ask for assistance in this ongoing problem. Joe has called them but he doesn't feel that he has much influence.

The closing sign in the lower lot of the Community Center is still down. Ed will have it put back up. The Hart property has a new sign which copies the signage from Hickory Bluff. It is a "Police Take Notice" sign. Tammy mentioned that the Farm Creek people would very much appreciate Joe's checking out the path at the Hart property. Lynne Pratt noted that there had been a robbery at #2 Farm Creek Road.

Community Center Trees

Six Dogwoods that did not survive the heat, no matter how much attention and watering was given to them, have been removed. They will be replaced in the fall. It appears that all the other Dogwoods, Sugar Maples, and Red Oak that were planted are surviving. Watering and maintenance will continue as before.

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Community Center Drainage System

McVac has completed their task of cleaning out the drainage system surrounding the Community Center building.

A root system was discovered in an area leading off the property towards Rowayton School. This will not affect the drainage related directly to the main building. If we wish to remove this root growth problem, there would be an additional cost of approximately **\$2,000.00**

Community Center Dog Park Fence at McKinley Avenue

The damaged fence and gate next to the repaired stone wall has been restored.

It would be advisable that dogs remain on their leash until they have been escorted past the newly constructed split rail fence and into the enclosed dog park area.

Pinkney Park Trees

Pinkney House Alarm

I have contacted Jeanne Rilling, the Alarm Administrator, about the false alarm charges dated 05/23/10. There were two false alarms that day. One at 12:39 p.m. and one at 5:43 p.m. The charges were for \$75.00 each. Ms Rilling spoke to Officer Joe Jensen about this, as he was in Pinkney Park when the alarms went off. He stated that no one was there to trigger the false alarm. It was his opinion that the alarm system was at fault. Jeanne Rilling agreed to waive the total charges of **\$150.00**

Rowayton RR Station Parking Lot

Metro North has been working on the station platform. They are cleaning and anticipate painting the overhang. They seem to be working mostly at night.

Louis Paris has informed me of his intent to resign as guard. Mr. Paris proposed that his last day be August 4, 2010 (the day he receives his prior two week pay check). His last actual pay period ends July 30, 2010. I asked Mr. Paris to inform Dick Schock of his intended resignation date. He refused. I asked him to put his resignation in writing. He refused. I have drafted a form of resignation for Mr. Paris to sign. The resignation date is for August 4, 2010 as requested by Mr. Paris. This will mean we carry Mr. Paris over for three extra days beyond his normal end of week pay period. Dick Schock has back-up to cover the hours that Mr. Paris works.

Officer Joe Jensen has expressed interest in a position as guard at the Rowayton RR station, once he retires.

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Rowayton RR Station Bridge Construction

Previously reported. (See Minutes p.3, paragraph 1, line 2 - p. 3, paragraph 6).

Andy Conroy stated that he would like another item to be added to the agenda which would be Discussion of Negotiations of RR lease with DOT, including Mr. Craig Bordiere, to be discussed in Executive Session. A motion to that effect was made by John Igneri and passed, without discussion.

Treasurer's Report - Andy Conroy

We have a pattern, indicated on the graph distributed, of receipt of funds in each six month period. We get almost all of our money in a couple of months of the year. We don't get much money in July even though we need a lot of money in July since it is the beginning of a new Fiscal Year and the closing of the prior Fiscal Year. (Our funds come from the City of Norwalk as our share of property taxes collected). Andy said that we strive to have about \$200,000 at the end of the Fiscal Year. We've taken in a little over \$60,000 which is 10% of what we expect in the first six months of the Fiscal Year. We should probably have a bit more in reserves at the end of a FY. That \$60K compared to what we carried over just about covers everything we need. We probably should end the Fiscal Year with a bit more in reserve.

The State has asked us for some reports on the railroad. They're very focused on the reinvestment fund. We've been putting money aside to have enough to repave the parking lots at the RR station. The state wants that money. They originally agreed that we would be building up a fund for paving. They don't seem to remember this now. Nancy commented that what we are saying now is that these funds are "restricted" and the state shouldn't be able to take them. There's probably not much we can do about this. Their position is that they can take ½ of any surplus that we make consistent with the lease we have with them. Our interpretation of the lease and their interpretation are not the same.

RR Guards Report. Dick Schock reported that the reflective vests for the guards are a great success. He would like four more of them for the guards who don't now have them. Dick also mentioned that they found a way to have a scooter space. Dick has designated a couple of spaces for pregnant women and handicapped people. Today they didn't have any empty spaces. He sent several cars to the Eastbound side. He put five cars in the center of the lot. They've changed the attitude of the guards and they strive to be a service-oriented entity. Dick said that the lots are so full because of the work being done at the station. Tammy thanked Dick for the service he is giving our commuters. Tammy also thanked the Clerk, Andrea Woodworth, for a renewal permitting event that went so smoothly.

Jack said that we had received a bill for \$149 from Servco Heating and Air Conditioning. This was signed off on by Leslie Korzennick of the Rowayton Historical Society. Mike

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Barbis said that as the landlord we are responsible for the bill. However, we are instituting a policy of getting a service contract with any new equipment that goes into any District property. Mike said we should have a schedule of these service contracts to which we can refer. As the landlord and the responsible party, all service calls should be generated through the District. This generated this particular service call.
